#### Woodland description

This wood is notable for its surviving natural features, intactness and size. It supports rich 'Atlantic' bryophyte, lichen and fern communities. The woodland is mainly oak-dominated rising into birch wood, with rowan, holly and ash. The ground flora is typical of broadleaf woodland, and in places is showing recovery from heavy *R. ponticum* infestation or conifer overshading.

#### History of management

Purchased from the trustees for C.B. Holman in 1967.

This woodland has been cleared of virtually all the conifers (felled to recycle c.1995) and restoration of broadleaf woodland is especially noticeable in the ground flora species.

#### Conservation features

**Hairy wood ant** *Formica lugubris* recorded in the woodland.

**Dragonfly** breeding site including Northern Emerald.

#### **Chequered skipper**

Common Orache *Atriplex praecox*, a strand line plant, which forms part of the SSSI **vascular plant** assemblage, at NM 68500 65340.

**Lichen assemblages** – not surveyed.

**Bryophytes** 

A largely unknown bryophyte flora, with the exception of some of the burns, though what little information is available suggests a good oceanic woodland and ravine flora.

Burns surveyed through the Sunart survey did not find any Category A watercourses in this woodland, though some of the burns did hold specialist ravine indicator species such as *Colura calyptrifolia*, *Harpalejeunea molleri*, *Lophocolea fragrans*, *Radula aquilegia* and *Aphanolejeunea microscopica*.

#### Heritage features

The woodland has evidence of human activity for centuries.

Scheduled prehistoric cairn. (Salen, cairn 600m NNW of head of Salen Bay SM7818) It comprises a round cairn measuring approximately 10.5m in diameter and about 1.7m in height. Cairns of this type are funerary monuments dating to the Neolithic and Bronze Age and may be expected to contain material relating to their mode of construction and use. 35m diameter circular scheduled area. There is a second cairn closer to the shore but off the NFE.

Collection of 15 receded platforms at Ruighe a'Phollain. These are across the main road from the Ruighe a'Phollain deserted township.

Salen village head dyke – recorded as a point but separately, a couple of buildings are also recorded close the head dyke.

Salen mill - In the 19th Century, Salen had a thriving bobbin industry because of the availability of birch and oak in the surrounding woodlands. The Pirn Mill at Salen was sited behind the Old Post Office and constructed to produce bobbins or pirns for the Clark Company in Paisley. It operated from the early 1840s until 1854, when it was destroyed by fire, and was said to have been largely manned by lads from Glasgow. The mill was powered by water, the dam being on the hill above. The following unsigned comment is found in a Clan Cameron Archive on the Internet: "An extensive manufactory of bobbins for thread is carried on at Salen, on Loch Sunart; the machinery is very ingenious, and moved by immense power, the water-wheel being forty feet in diameter." Claimed to be the largest in Western Scotland.

#### **PAWS**

62 ha of PAWS of high ecological potential along with a 4ha fringe of native woodland that is not categorised in the Ancient Woodland Inventory but that does displaying PAWS characteristics. The balance of the area is open ground with varying levels of natural regeneration of native species. The SSSI boundary approximately follows that of the PAWS. Out-with the designated area, there is former conifer woodland and open space with varying degrees of natural regeneration.

#### Access

There is one vehicle access point to edge of wood that passes though residential properties. No vehicular access within wood. Wood can also be accessed on foot via tracks from the village and the electricity substation on A87 to north.

#### Recreation

Informal recreation - mainly walking, from the village.

#### <u>Other</u>

Powerline on eastern edge of woodland.

Underground power supply to covered reservoir at NM68536502

#### Water supply in Allt a t'Sailean.

Mains water pipe under the track that runs parallel to the A861 (NM69066543 to NM68896495).










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
